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Bay Area Prepares for Super Bowl and Large Scale Events

After more than a year of preparation, the Super Bowl is almost here! Beginning on January 30th, thousands of visitors will be arriving to enjoy a series of concerts, the "NFL Experience", and the "Fan Dome" in San Francisco,



all leading up to Super Bowl 50 on February 7 in Santa Clara.

In order to ensure a safe and successful event, significant planning efforts have been going on around the Bay

Area. Preparation efforts included: a four-part workshop and tabletop exercise series conducted by San Francisco for all involved City agencies and partners; monthly regional coordination meetings conducted by Santa Clara



for key cities such as Santa Clara, San Jose, Palo Alto, and neighboring Operational Areas; and a briefing for senior public safety officials to share plans and provide ongoing status updates for Super Bowl related events.

The UASI Management Team also led a series of capability building workshops and a regional EOC Exercise (Urban Shield Yellow Command) to support local jurisdictions in their preparations for this large



scale event. The workshop series included regional collaboration on day-to-day operations, planning for mutual aid, public information, and information sharing platforms such as Cal COP and WebEOC/CalEOC.

As a result of stakeholder input and lessons learned through the Super Bowl 50 planning process, a Large Special Event Planning Guide and Concept of Operations (CONOPs) Template has been developed for use by local jurisdictions. This downloadable document can be found on the UASI website and UASI Management Team staff is available to conduct an orientation and training session for jurisdictions that are planning a large scale event.

Bay Area UASI Updates

Bay Ferry IV Full Scale Exercise

On January 20th, Golden Gate Ferry hosted "Bay Ferry IV", an emergency preparedness exercise. Held on



San Francisco Bay, Treasure Island, and Jack London Square, over 500 first responders from 40 local, state, federal and agencies tested their response capabilities emergencies.

Using elements from the Urban Shield blueprint, the Bay Area UASI's Training and Exercise Team provided design assistance in the development of real world These scenarios ranged from an active shooter on a ferry, a mass casualty incident with ferry evacuation, and the rad/nuc decontamination of a ferry.

Prior to the exercise, Preventive Rad/Nuc Detection (PRND) teams from around the region attended a two-day QuickStart Class developed by the DHS Domestic Nuclear Detection Office (DNDO) and hosted by the Bay Area UASI Training & First-responders learned Exercise Program. radiation basics, primary and secondary radiological and nuclear detection screening, and technical reachback that they put into use during the event.

State, local, and federal subject matter experts acted as evaluators, controllers, and trainers. Participation by the FBI, the US Coast Guard, and DNDO also enhanced the region's collaborative efforts. Additionally, the Mobile Deployment Detection Unit (MDDU) from DNDO provided equipment to supplement participating agencies' inventory as well as provide an opportunity for them to test their skills in anticipation of the Super Bowl on At the conclusion of the exercise, February 7. players, evaluators, and controllers participated in a hot wash to collect feedback on the PRND portion of Bay Ferry IV for the After Action Report.

Information Sharing

Many elements are involved in the preparation for a large scale event like the Super Bowl. The NCRIC's Risk Management Unit (RMU) has worked closely

with venues around the Bay Area

to provide threat assessments and to provide assistance with special event planning. the regional intelligence/ fusion center, the NCRIC will also be playing an important role for this event by providing

staff for analytical support in the areas of digital forensics, IT and cyber, and information sharing.

In addition to staff support, the NCRIC will also utilize the region's resources and tools to provide real time information and data sharing to San Francisco, Santa Clara, and San Mateo Counties during the Super Bowl. These resources include coordination with the state through the use of Cal COP (California's Common Operating Picture) and Mutualink (a real time interoperable communications and multimedia sharing platform). Urban Shield 2016



Planning efforts for Urban Shield 2016 are well underway. Funded by the Bay Area UASI and hosted by the Alameda

County Sheriff's Office, the exercise is scheduled to take place September 9 -12, 2016. Entering its 10th year, the full scale exercise features over 58 unique and realistic emergency scenarios testing first responder capabilities in SWAT, HazMat, EOD, Urban Search and Rescue, Maritime, Preventive Rad/Nuc Detection, and Emergency Management. This year, Yellow Command will feature a Point of Distribution (POD) exercise to test plans for water distribution and POD security. Congress passes Appropriations Bill

In December, President Obama signed the 2016 annual appropriations bill into law (Public Law 114-

113). The legislation includes provisions for \$600 million for the UASI grant program with a \$20 million non-profit set-aside. Thus, the net amount of UASI FY 2016 grants is \$580 million, or \$7 million less than the amount received in FY 2015.

Public Health- Multi Agency Coordination Handbook

The Bay Area's Multi-Agency Coordination (MAC) Group recently completed a draft regional handbook which will assist Public Health departments in situation assessment, information sharing, incident prioritization and resource allocation. MAC Groups are comprised of public health administrators authorized to commit agency resources and funds during a medical or public health incident. These groups provide coordinated decision-making and resource allocation among cooperating agencies, establish priorities among incidents, and provide strategic guidance and direction to support incident management activities. When completed, the handbook will be posted on the Bay Area UASI website.

New Grant Rules

The Uniform Guidance (aka the Super Circular) has a number of new requirements for the FY 15 and later grants.


- 1. Grantees (or sub-grantees) are now required to evaluate the risk of allocating grant funds to sub-recipients. This evaluation process must include an analysis of the sub-recipients' history of performance with grant funds, their project management capabilities, and financial stability. No specific guidance on this requirement has been issued, but will be distributed when received.
- 2. Sub-recipients must now provide documentation in their contract packages that ALL vendors (including a vendor's subcontractors) are not suspended or debarred. To provide this documentation, sub-recipients must check the status of the vendor(s) at: www.SAM.gov and print out the documentation on the day the contract is awarded.

Compliance Corner:

Sole Source

Changes are coming to sole source purchase requirements!

Beginning in the FY 2015 grant year, the state sole source requirement threshold was increased from \$100,000 to \$150,000. However, in order for jurisdictions to be



REMEMBER:

- State sole source approval MUST be sought each grant year if you are using the same vendor, on the same contract, for the same project
- State sole source approvals are only eligible for no more than four grant cycles before the jurisdiction must go out to bid again
